Habitat Acquisition Trust's “Connecting for Conservation in the Capital Region” Project Interim Report

The purpose of the “Connecting for Conservation in the CRD” project is to facilitate co-operation and communication among the more than eighty volunteer organizations in the Capital Region working on environmental stewardship and conservation projects.

*A primary objective is to **minimize** duplication of effort and **maximize** productivity among these groups.*

This exciting project is really bringing about results. We are very pleased with the progress of the project this far and are already planning for future phases. Activities To Date

- ◆ Tara Todesco, a student of the University of Victoria, was hired through the coop program to coordinate the project. She worked from January – April 2001.
- ◆ Tara began researching conservation and stewardship organizations in the Capital Region and collecting contact information.
- ◆ On January 26, 2001 a Planning Session was held at St. Ann's Academy in Victoria to seek input on the project and the on-line database from conservation/ stewardship organizations. Seventy (70) organizations were invited to the Planning Session and fifteen (15) attended. Habitat Acquisition Trust asked their opinion on three major topics:
 - the possibility of a Memorandum of Understanding among conservation/stewardship organizations in the region,
 - the plan for the forum, and
 - the development of the on-line searchable database.

The Planning Session participants indicated that they felt that the forum was the place to discuss the Memorandum of Understanding and that they were supportive of the on-line database/website but that it must be easy to use and professionally designed. They said that in addition to the website they would like a listserv established for ease of communication. They requested that the forum be kept to one day as it was too difficult to ask people to commit to an entire weekend. They suggested that the forum be closed to the public during the morning and open to the public in the afternoon and that roundtables be established to run throughout the day to facilitate discussion on topics of interest.

- ◆ HAT continued to collect information about conservation and stewardship groups in the region until April
- ◆ In February HAT put out an Invitation to Quote to three (3) website design companies. Two responded and WebWare Solutions was selected. Throughout March design meetings were held to ensure that the website would be easy to use and easily kept up to date.
- ◆ Throughout March HAT continued to collect information from organizations, and to plan the forum. HAT also began to establish a listserv of organizations
- ◆ On April 21, 2001 the "Connecting for Conservation" forum was held at the Crystal Garden. Sixty (60) groups attended all day, many with two or three volunteers, and

more than one hundred and fifty (150+) members of the public came in during the afternoon. The event was held on the same day as the Walk for Global Justice and was considered one of the Earth Week events. Participation in the forum was free-of-charge for groups and the public.

- ◆ A questionnaire was distributed at the forum seeking feedback on the project
- ◆ At the April 21 forum MLA Steve Orcherton, representing Involve BC, helped us launch the on-line database/website during a noon ceremony. The website can be seen at:

- ◆ On April 25 the listserv became active with more than one hundred (100) e-mail addresses included. Two listservs have been established through OneNorthwest in Seattle. One is a broadcast listserv for HAT to share information about the project and the network and the other is for discussions among the networking groups.

Activities Still to be Completed

- ◆ A summer student will be hired to continue the project through the Summer
- ◆ Follow-up is needed with organizations who have not yet entered their profiles on the website.
- ◆ Once complete the website needs to be printed and mailed to relevant organizations and agencies.
- ◆ The results of the questionnaires need to be compiled and acted on.
- ◆ Changes to the website may be made as needed.
- ◆ Further workshops will be organized as needed. HAT has been approached by the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society to co-host a meeting in June for organizations interested in continuing the discussion of one the forum roundtables on "Creating a Conservation Vision for the Region"
